"OUT of the DEPTHS"

Psalm 130:1-8

(3 Specific Seasons When God Promises To Hear Our Prayer)

"Out of the depths have I cried unto thee, O Lord. Lord, hear my voice; let thine ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications" (v. 1, 2)

— INTRODUCTION —

Fact: Psalm 130 is listed as a song of degrees. (a rapid progression from despair to delight)

<u>Fact:</u> This psalm is an answered prayer in extreme distress.

<u>Fact:</u> What the psalmist experienced is for every child of God.

Questions: #1. What does it mean to cry "out of the depths"? (v. 1)

#2. What does it mean to be "marked with iniquities"? (v.3)

#3. What does it mean to "watch for the morning"? (v.6)

(3 Seasons God Will Reveal Himself)

I. God Answers Prayer In The DEEP (v. 1, 2)

"Out of the depths have I cried unto thee, O Lord." (v. 1)

Question: What are the "depths" of life?

Answer: The psalmist is experiencing some type of....

1. Distress 3. Desert

2. Despair 4. Delay

Why is the experience described as "the depths"?

Answer: Because it is a season that....

Question:

• Is difficult to see a way out.

• It is far below the surface level of comfort.

• It is overwhelming in nature.

• It is a valley that has left him disappointed.

Question: What does the psalmist do "in the deep"?

Answer" He turns to the Lord.

"Let thine ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications" (v. 2)

Question: Why does the psalmist turn to the Lord in prayer? Because he knows something that we must know:

- No matter how deep the water may be, it is never too deep where we cannot pray!
- Regardless of the depth of your valley or pain, it cannot separate you from the Lord!

- Whenever we pray and cry out to the Lord in earnest prayer, we will be rewarded with the perfect peace of God.
- Prayer will focus our attention on God instead of the circumstances surrounding us.

II. God Answers Prayer In The COURTHOUSE (v. 3, 4)

"If thou Lord shouldest mark iniquities, O Lord, who shall stand?" (v. 3)

Fact: This is a picture of the real trial of the century.

Fact: It is a picture of you and me on trial.

Fact: We are seen standing in the courthouse before the Judge.

Fact: We've been made aware of our own sins.

Fact: We are seen without a defense or excuse for crimes committed against God.

(So much so that...)

If God tells the truth about us and our iniquities, who could even stand in His presence? (v. 3)

(What will the Judge do now?)

- Will His love be greater than His judgment of sin?
- Will He remember all of our failures of the past?
- Will God embarrass us and expose us to the world?
- What exactly will God do when we cry out of the depths of conviction over our sin?

"But there is forgiveness with thee" (v. 4)

And I discover here:

- That God has pardoned me of all my sin!
- That God has forgiven me all my iniquities.
- That God has paid my debt, paid my penalty and cleared my record.

Question: What is forgiveness?

Answer: The cancellation of a debt as if it never existed!

Question: How can I be sure I am forgiven by God?

- "As far as the east is from the west, so far hath He removed our transgressions from us." (Psalm 103:12)
- "Thou hast cast all my sins behind thy back." (Isaiah 38:17)
- God has tread our sin underfoot and hurled all our iniquities into the depths of the sea. (Micah 7:19)
- "He has made us accepted in the Beloved" (Ephesians 1:6)
- "The Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all" (Isaiah 53:6)

III. God Answers Prayer In The NIGHTTIME (v. 5, 6)

"My soul waiteth for the Lord more than they that watch for the morning" (v. 6)

Fact: The psalmist is patiently waiting for a change.

Fact: He feels like he is in the dark and that morning never comes.

<u>Fact:</u> The dawning of his dream, vision, answered prayer and divine intervention seems to be "on hold."

Question: Are you "on hold" waiting for some earthly circumstance to change? **Question:** Does it seem like God is slow to expose some injustice in your life? **Question:** Is there a "night season" with no sunrise yet in sight to shout about?

(The Ministry Of Patience)

"Add to your faith, patience" (II Peter 1:5, 6)

"Walk worthy, with all meekness and long-suffering" (Ephesians 4:2)

Patience (HUPOMONE) means:

1. To continue

3. To remain

2. To wait

4. To persevere

Long-suffering (MAKROTHUMIA) means:

1. Forbearance

2. To be long tempered

3. To endure under adversity

Long-suffering (patience) is

1. The fruit that keeps us steadfast under adversity.

2. The grace to bear with difficult people or circumstances.

3. The power to endure hardship without

breaking down.

The result of patience?

"That you may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing" (James 1:4)

1. "Perfect" (TELEIOS) means - mature growth of character.

2. "Entire" (HOLOKLEROS) means - whole, complete and sound.

3. "Wanting nothing" (LEIPE MEDEN) means - no lack or contented.

The secret is: "In His Word Do I Hope" (v. 5)

- Believe that God will keep you in the night seasons.
- Believe that God will anchor you when "on hold."
- Believe that God will reward you for being patient.
